THE BODY IN MARGINALITY | National Museum, Through June 7.

This major exhibition brings together work from across Indian art history, exploring the various meanings the body holds in the nation's psyche. Curators have drawn from sources ranging from archaeological research facilities to major museums, with a particular focus on ancient art. First seen at the Musée des Beaux-Arts in Brussels last year, this is the exhibition's first trip to India.

PARIS 1900: THE CITY OF ENTERTAINMENT | Petit Palais, Through Aug. 17.

The 1900 Paris World Fair attracted 51 million visitors, and introduced the wider public to art nouveau. More than 600 works are included in this exhibition, which uses paintings, wardrobe items, and objets d'art from the World Fair and beyond to recreate the city's Belle Époque atmosphere. The show mixes iconic works from artists such as Auguste Rodin and Paul Cézanne with lesser-known ones by Alphonse Mucha and René-Jules Lalique, among others.
